This was a major step towards updating our forest stewardship plan in preparation for creating a conservation easement on the eastern wetland portion of the land.

Planning & Development: In close consultation with the Potential Residents Advisory Group (PRAG), we have just put out a detailed online survey that should tell us how many members are ready to commit to moving forward, when, and at what financial levels. It is vital to know, concretely and specifically, what CGEV members are ready and eager for, and what our financial capacity is as a community to self-finance infrastructure and/or secure the needed loan. If you haven't filled it out yet, please do so by Monday, 31 July! • As you know, some months ago we let go of our

long-time vision of a housing cooperative built all at once with a blanket mortgage. We've gotten creative and are exploring two other ways to proceed. "CGEV 2.0" (which you heard about in June) laid out a path where the community provides only infrastructure and individual members or families or small groups design, finance, and provide for the building of homes. We continue to keep CGEV 2.0 formally in the mix - that is, building out the whole village infrastructure at once but the number of members it requires to be ready to buy in upfront seems unattainable. Now, we are exploring the feasibility of a scaled-back and phased plan, "CGEV 3.0" which seems much more do-able. We need more cost and regulatory information, but it seems promising. Interested? Listen to the July Community in the Round recording here. We're working hard to keep everyone informed and appreciate your input (and patience) with this complex process.
